Teamwork:



Build relationships with colleagues and customers representing diverse cultures, races, ages, genders, religions, lifestyles and viewpoints.

Developed in: group projects, student organizations.

Professionalism/ Work Ethic:



Demonstrate personal accountability and effective work habits, e.g., punctuality, working productively with others, and time management.

Developed in: class attendance, completing assignments on time.

Career Management:



Identify and articulate one’s skills, strengths, knowledge, and experiences relevant to career goals.

Oral/Written Communication:

Articulate thoughts and ideas clearly and effectively in written and oral forms to persons inside/outside the organization.

Leadership:

Leverage the strengths of others to achieve common goals, and use interpersonal skills to coach and develop others.

Digital Technology:
